The end of October brings up a holiday that most of us used to enjoy only as children but has become quite popular as an adult event in recent years - Halloween. Like in Colorado, growing up in Vermont when we planned our costumes we had to be sure they could accommodate the additional clothing we might need for colder weather. I grew up in a timeframe where when we said "Trick or Treat" that we might get challenged as to what Trick we would play if not given a Treat. Such a challenge today likely gets a blank stare.

Later in life that I learned that Halloween translates to All Hallow's Eve - the vigil of the Solemnity of All Saints (or "All Hallows") on November 1st. The latter has roots in the feast of all Martyrs - held on May 13th. The date changed during the reign of Pope Gregory III (731-741) when he dedicated an oratory on November 1st in old St Peter's Basilica to the relics "of the holy apostles and of all saints, martyrs and confessors". Pope Gregory IV (827-844) made All Saints Day a holy day of obligation.

While we should all aspire to be Saints, we know we all have Souls. On November 2nd we celebrate All Souls Day - a day to pray for all the faithful departed, especially those believed to be in purgatory. The celebration is believed to have been started by St Odilo of Cluny (962-1049) in his congregation. It quickly spread throughout France and to the rest of Europe.

A ritual coming up shortly after is our quadrennial vote to elect a new president (along with votes on other offices and important issues). Certainly political ads will dominate the TV and our mailboxes - many with very slanted views of the candidates and issues. I urge all eligible to do your best to work through the rhetoric, be well informed and make voting decisions based on what is important to you.

John 13:12-15

¹² So when he had washed their feet [and] put his garments back on and reclined at table again, he said to them, "Do you realize what I have done for you? ¹³ You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am. ¹⁴ If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵ I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do.

Scripture of the Month is taken from *The New American Bible, Revised Edition* (NABRE) at <u>www.usccb.org/bible</u>, which provides explanatory introductions and footnotes, and is used in support of the Holy Father's prayer intention for the month of October, that the Church continue to sustain in all ways a Synodal lifestyle, as a sign of co-responsibility, promoting the participation, the communion, and the mission shared among priests, religious, and lay people.

Papal Commentary on Scripture of the Month

"Synodality, as a constitutive element of the Church, offers us the most appropriate interpretive framework for understanding the hierarchical ministry itself. If we understand, as Saint John Chrysostom says, that 'Church and Synod are synonymous,' inasmuch as the Church is nothing other than the 'journeying together' of God's flock along the paths of history towards the encounter with Christ the Lord, then we understand too that, within the Church, no one can be 'raised up' higher than others. On the contrary, in the Church, it is necessary that each person 'lower' himself or herself, so as to serve our brothers and sisters along the way."

"Jesus founded the Church by setting at her head the Apostolic College, in which the Apostle Peter is the 'rock' (cf. *Mt* 16:18), the one who must confirm his brethren in the faith (cf. *Lk* 22:32). But in this Church, as in an inverted pyramid, the top is located beneath the base. Consequently, those who exercise authority are called 'ministers,' because, in the original meaning of the word, they are the least of all. It is in serving the people of God that each bishop becomes, for that portion of the flock entrusted to him, *vicarius Christi*, the vicar of that Jesus who at the Last Supper bent down to wash the feet of the Apostles (cf. *Jn* 13:1-15). And in a similar perspective, the Successor of Peter is nothing else if not the servus servorum Dei."

And the Seminarian is ... (from page 6)

Did you recognize IHM deacon Taylor Elder? He was born on June 2, 1956, in a Denver hospital and spent his early childhood in the rural farming community Woodrow - out on the Eastern plains near Fort Morgan. His family was Methodist, but attended services very infrequently. Taylor's early memories of church are painful - partly as his older brother was under strict orders to keep Taylor in line and did so with a vice grip on Taylor's knee.

Taylor met Rose (a Cradle Catholic) in Commerce City and they started dating. When Rose said she had to go to Mass, Taylor offered to accompany her - mainly to spend more time with Rose. When they talked of marriage, Rose said that she had to promise that their children would be raised Catholic. Taylor agreed and said he would always go to Mass with Rose - a promise that Rose's mother doubted. Rose and Taylor were married on June 14, 1975 at Our Lady of the Church in Commerce City. While Taylor hoped Rose might miss a Mass or two, she never did and Taylor kept his promise to attend with Rose - partly as he wasn't going to let his mother-in-law be right.

In 1990, Taylor asked Rose to check into what it would take for him to become Catholic. He was stunned to hear that it involved 9 months of classes and thought "I don't want to be a priest". At the first class, the leader played "Come to the Water" and invited students, if they felt called, to come up to the Holy Water. The song moved Taylor and he was all in. At the Easter Vigil in 1991, Taylor would be baptized, receive First Communion and be Confirmed - and it made his marriage sacramental. After that, Taylor felt a longing to still be involved and became an RCIA table leader.

A few years later, Taylor started privately thinking about the diaconate. When Rose (with no knowledge of Taylor's thoughts) submitted Taylor in "Called by Name" for consideration as deacon, that was the sign Taylor needed to start studies. Deacon Taylor was ordained on June 12, 1999 (with fellow IHM parishioners James Gollhoffer &

Leonard "Buzz" Onesky) and spent his first 6 years at St Louis in Louisville. In June 2005, Deacon Taylor brought his ministry to IHM - joining newly ordained Deacon Jerome Durnford. Deacon Taylor became IHM's Business Administrator in October 2013. He and Rose have two children - Tauna and Christopher - and 5 grandsons & 1



SEMINARY EVENTS

St John Vianney Seminary is normally closed to the public. They do have a couple event types open to the public.

Monthly, usually on the First Friday, there's an open Mass at noon in Christ the King Chapel (see picture to the left) on campus. You'll be amongst seminarians, staff, and other members of the public. Upcoming Masses for the year are October 4th, November 1st (a Holy Day of obligation, how about celebrating in this unique setting), and December 6th. If you go, spend some time exploring the beautiful areas off the sides of the altar.

They also have a "Vigil Praise" on select Saturdays, 7-9pm. Upcoming events are on September 28th, October 26th, and December 14th.

The seminary is located at 1300 S Steele St in Denver. Quick directions are to take I-25 south, get off on University Blvd, heading north. Go right at the first right onto Florida Ave. Look for a left onto Monroe St. At the stop sign, turn left into the Seminary grounds, follow left around to visitor parking. Go into the obvious entrance and you'll be directed down the hall to the chapel. Note that if you enter the seminary grounds via Steele St, there's limited parking around the chapel – most of it for handicapped.

Papal Commentary on Scripture of the (Previous) Month

"[St.] Francis [of Assisi] helps us to see that an integral ecology calls for openness to categories which transcend the language of mathematics and biology, and take us to the heart of what it is to be human. Just as happens when we fall in love with someone, whenever he would gaze at the sun, the moon or the smallest of animals, he burst into song, drawing all other creatures into his praise. He communed with all creation, even preaching to the flowers, inviting them 'to praise the Lord, just as if they were endowed with reason'. His response to the world around him was so much more than intellectual appreciation or economic calculus, for to him each and every creature was a sister united to him by bonds of affection. That is why he felt called to care for all that exists. His disciple Saint Bonaventure tells us that, 'from a reflection on the primary source of all things, filled with even more abundant piety, he would call creatures, no matter how small, by the name of 'brother' or 'sister''. Such a conviction cannot be written off as naive romanticism, for it affects the choices which determine our behavior. If we approach nature and the environment without this openness to awe and wonder, if we no longer speak the language of fraternity and beauty in our relationship with the world, our attitude will be that of masters, consumers, ruthless exploiters, unable to set limits on their immediate needs. By contrast, if we feel intimately united with all that exists, then sobriety and care will well up spontaneously. The poverty and austerity of Saint Francis were no mere veneer of asceticism, but something much more radical: a refusal to turn reality into an object simply to be used and controlled."
