GRAND KNIGHT'S LETTER - Douglas Blondin

Brother Knights, Ladies Auxiliary and IHM Congregation:

November has much for us to celebrate. As I wasn't sure when the newsletter would reach you, I already talked about All Saints Day and All Souls Day in my October letter.

If I were to ask you "What's the Pope's Church," you'd likely say Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome. However, Saint John Lateran is the official Cathedral of the Diocese of Rome and serves as the seat of the Bishop of Rome (aka the Pope). It was built in the time of Constantine and consecrated by Pope Sylvester in 324. The dedication feast day is November 9th.



On November 18th we celebrate the dedication to Saints Peter and Paul. This celebrates Saint Peter's Basilica in Vatican City and the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls in Rome.

The Feast of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated on November 21st. This commemorates the presentation of the child Mary by her parents at the Temple in Jerusalem.

Of course, November is most known for Thanksgiving Day - this year as late as it can be on the 28th. Growing up, most of us likely heard that the first Thanksgiving was held in 1621 when the Pilgrims in Plymouth, Massachusetts, had a feast with the Wampanoag Native Americans.

However, in 1619, British settlers proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving when they reached the site known as Berkeley Hundred on the banks of Virginia's James River. A number of years before that, in 1565, Spanish explorers and the local Timucua people of St Augustine, Florida, celebrated a mass of Thanksgiving. There was also a rich tradition from Egyptians, Greeks, Romans, and Native American cultures of giving thanks at harvest time festivals.

The roots of what we think of as Thanksgiving go back to 1789 when President George Washington designated November 26th of that year "as a day of public Thanksgiving and prayers to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God." President John Adams issued a "Day of Public Thanksgiving for Peace." President Thomas Jefferson scuttled public observances - citing separation of church and state.

During the Civil War in 1863, President Abraham Lincoln made it federally formalized as an annual tradition when proclaiming a national "day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens" to be held on the last Thursday in November. In 1942, Thanksgiving moved to its current date on the fourth Thursday of November.

Prayers for safe travels on Thanksgiving and that it be a good time with family & friends.

Scripture of the Month is taken from *The New American Bible, Revised Edition* (NABRE) at www.usccb.org/bible, which provides explanatory introductions and footnotes, and is used in support of the Holy Father's prayer intention for the month of November, for anyone who has lost a child, that the parents who mourn the loss of a son or daughter find support in their community and receive peace and consolation from the Holy Spirit.

Papal Commentary on Scripture of the Month

"The loss of a child is an experience that does not accept theoretical descriptions and rejects the banality of religious or sentimental words, of sterile encouragement or circumstantial phrases that, while they are intended to console, end up hurting even more those who, like you, face a tough inner battle every day. We must not slip into the attitude of Job's friends, who offer a pitiful and meaningless spectacle, attempting to justify suffering, even resorting to religious theories. Rather, we are required to imitate the emotion and compassion of Jesus in the face of suffering, that leads Him to live the same sufferings of the world in his own flesh.

"Pain, especially when it is so agonizing and without explanation, needs only to cling to the thread of a prayer that cries out to God, day and night, that sometimes expresses itself in the absence of words, that does not attempt to resolve the drama but, on the contrary, inhabits questions that always recur: 'Why, Lord? Why did it happen to me? Why did you not intervene? Where are you, while humanity suffers and my heart mourns an unfathomable loss?'.

"Brothers and sisters, these questions, which burn within, trouble the heart; at the same time, though, if we set out, with such courage and also with hardship as you do, it is precisely these same pained questions that open up glimmers of light, that give the strength to keep going. Indeed, there is nothing worse than silencing pain, suppressing suffering, removing trauma without coming to terms with it, as our world often induces us to do, in haste and in a daze. The question that one lifts up to God as a cry is, instead, salutary. It is prayer. Although it forces us to dig into a painful memory and to mourn the loss, at the same time it becomes the first step of invocation and opens one up to receive the consolation and inner peace that the Lord does not fail to give."


ADULT CHRISTMAS PARTY

Knight of the Month - Fr. Ernest Bayer

Fr. Ernest is a native of Bristol, Connecticut. His family spent a summer vacation on a dude ranch in 1972 and decided to move to Durango, Colorado when he was 10. His parents bought 35 acres and went in with another couple to build a house. His father was trained as an electrician. Fr. Ernest says he was not too interested in church and dropped out of Confirmation class. In 10 grade he went backpacking in the mountains and was struck by the beauty of nature. A girl-friend invited him to Campus Crusaders for Christ. He grew in his faith and he was a strong Christian ready to follow Jesus. His parents worked multiple jobs to support 3 sons and a daughter in Durango. After $4\frac{1}{2}$ years they decided to return to



Bristol, where Fr. Ernest graduated from a public high school. He was confirmed in 12th grade. A priest talked about the priesthood, saying, "you're available, and someone's got to do it." Fr. Ernest went to Leuven, Belgium for 4 years of major seminary. After spending time discerning his call to vocation, he applied to the new St. John Vianney seminary in Denver. With so many years of study already, he was sent to Lateran University in Rome. He got class notes in Italian and had them translated. He passed the rigorous exams and returned to Denver where Archbishop Chaput ordained him a deacon in 2000 and a priest in 2001. He was assigned to Craig, Colorado and loved it. Soon he was pastor of Holy Name in Steamboat Springs, where he served 17 years. His parents and sister moved to Steamboat. Father loves to ski, snowboard, hike, bike, and enjoy the great Colorado outdoors.

In the last few years there have been many changes for Father Ernest. His parents passed away. He was asked by Archbishop Aquila to come to IHM, leaving a ski town of 15 thousand for a metro area of 3 million. Father was impressed with how IHM says Mass, with the master of ceremony wearing vestments, the incense, and solemnity. Father tells a story where altar servers rushed straight from the ski slope to Mass, but they only had ski boots, so they served in their stocking feet. This worked in a ski town but not in Northglenn.

Father Ernest has injected his personal and spiritual energy to carry Immaculate Heart of Mary forward with new ministries and outreach to the Northglenn and Thornton communities. He is Council 7502 chaplain and a strong supporter of the KC. He has most assuredly earned the honor of Knight of the Month.

November 2024 Family of the Month - Levon and Kathryn Sergeeff Family

Levon is of Armenian origin. He was born in China December 25, 1942, as his parents family went there fleeing persecution in Armenia from the Turks. After the Communists came into China the situation deteriorated and when he was 11 years old his family including his parents, paternal grandmother, and sister escaped to Shanghai and then to Hong Kong where they were assisted by Catholic Relief Services in obtaining passage to Brazil. They were not allowed to come to the United States because they were coming from a Communist country. They spent 3 1/2 months on a half cargo half passenger ship. Quite an adventure for an 11-year-old since they stopped at all the ports to unload and load



cargo, and they were allowed off the ship. They spent 8 years in Brazil and Levon graduated from high school in 1961. He had been working in the Radio/TV repair business while in high school. They immigrated to Chicago in 1961. Levon got a job with Zenith and was drafted into the Army in 1965. He served two years in Vietnam in Field Artillery where he was exposed to Agent Orange.

Kathryn was born in Portland Oregon in 1948. She was raised there along with her twin brothers who contracted Polio at the age of 18 months. Kathryn was raised in Protestant churches but even as a young girl had the desire to become Catholic. At the age of 11 Kathryn's father, who was an Electrical Engineer, was transferred to Bell Labs in New Jersey. Kathryn finished her education there and then went on to Nursing School where she became an RN. Her parents moved to Colorado when her father was transferred to the Bell Labs in Westminster, Colorado. Kathryn moved to Chicago and worked at the University of Illinois Hospital where she met Levon who was working there as a Respiratory Therapist. Levon and Kathryn were married April 7, 1973. They have 1 girl and 2 boys and 3 grandchildren. Kathryn went back to college and graduated in 1988 from MSU with a BSN. She worked at Children's hospital for 14 years and spent the last 28 years of her career managing Boulder Community Home Care.

Levon worked at AT&T/Lucent for 25 years. Levon coached soccer at Northglenn High School for 6 years and Youth soccer. He was active in Junior Achievement, Volunteers of America, a Cub Scout leader, and Airport Ambassador. Kathryn and Levon went through RCIA in 1999 and joined IHM in 2000. Levon became a Knight in 2001 at IHM and obtained his 4th degree as well. He worked fish fries, picked up food for the food bank and was very active in the council. Kathryn was an RCIA team leader for several years and taught Children's Religious Education. She became a Eucharistic Minister and was a Lector for many years. Kathryn is currently active in the Ladies Auxiliary and will serve as VP this year. Levon and Kathryn are both active in the Active Seniors group at IHM. For their many contributions to the community, the Church, and the Knights, Levon and Kathryn Sergeeff are deserving of being selected as the November family of the month.

If you recognized Father George Kearney, congrats. And it likely means that you've been at IHM for a while and are good at aging photos - his time at IHM being about 30 years after the photo. Father George was ordained on May 29, 1953 - a Friday instead of the usual Saturday to avoid conflicting with the celebration of Memorial Day (it wasn't until 1968 that Memorial Day was moved to be celebrated on the last Monday in May).

Father George's first assignment was as assistant pastor at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception (1953-59). He was pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in Cheyenne Wells 1959-66 (along with its mission St Augustine in Kit Carson). Father George retuned to the Denver area as pastor at St Anthony of Padua, 1966-70. In 1969, he summited 19,341 ft Mt Kilimanjaro with a Colorado Mountain Club party. On the way down, the terrain allowed them to spread out and Father George said he walked 10 miles "All alone with God". Father George next served as Catholic Chaplain of Fort Logan Mental Health Center for 9 years. He served as associate pastor of Sacred Heart of Jesus in Boulder from 1979-82.

In the fall of 1982, Father George came to IHM. Those who attended Thanksgiving Day Mass during his tenure may recall that his homily always started out with a resounding "Over the River and Through the Woods" What many didn't know was that he commuted to IHM as he cared for his mother in her home for the last 10 years of her life, until her death in 1987. Father George left IHM with his retirement on June 1, 1989. He died on January 30, 2003, a few days shy of his 79th birthday (February 5th). His funeral Mass was celebrated on February 6th by then Archbishop Charles Chaput at the Cathedral. Father George was buried in Mount Olivet cemetery, alongside his parents Joseph and Sarah (McNamara) Kearney.


